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Senior Only Credential Programs

- Districts and schools have great flexibility in creating a Senior Only Credential Program for students.
- It allows a district or school to schedule instructional time for the student to achieve industry-recognized credentials based solely on credential attainment.



Who is It For?

Students in their senior year who:

- Have completed most of their curriculum requirements.
- Express interest in advancing their portfolio through earning industry-recognized credentials.
- May need to fulfill graduation requirements.



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Benefits of Industry-Recognized Credentials

- What is the benefit to a **school** offering the approved industryrecognized credential?
 - Provide transition beyond high school
 - \succ Incentive funding for credentials aligned to in-demand jobs
 - Credit on the state report card





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Why Offer It?

- Allows for a school to employ an industry-credential holder through a 12-hour teaching permit
- State-approved senior only programs receive career-technical education funding.
- Schools and districts also may offer credentials to students outside of a career-technical education program
- The state offers several options for graduation. Earning industry-recognized credentials are a foundation of many of those options.

Credentialing Cost and Reimbursement

- Credential cost is comprised of instructor training, equipment needs, transportation, exam cost, etc.
- Reimbursement program covers the cost of the exam fee for each student
 - Reimbursement can only be utilized once per credential, per student
 - A credential must be successfully earned in order to receive reimbursement



Starting a Senior ICO Program

- Analyze senior data to determine need
- Review labor market data and talk to industry advisory committee
- Research credentials
 - –Look at requirements for and value of credential
 - -Equipment needs, facilities needs, instructor requirements







Starting an ICO Program

- Determine credentials to offer
- Choose credentials totaling 12 points in one career cluster/field
- Determine hours needed for instruction for each credential (total hours max 920 for community schools and 1080 for other public schools)
- Contact your Career Technical Planning District for collaboration




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
